### Information

Patient receives information to say it is recommended they change statin and a prescription has been created which they can collect / activate

Patient receives information to say it is recommended they take statin and if they wish to do so they need to contact practice – prescription will then be issued

Patient receives information to say it is recommended they take statin during GP Consultation – prescription then created (if required)

### **Advice**

Patient receives further advice on why and the benefits via letter and website

Patient receives further advice on why and the benefits via letter and website **or** GP Practice **or** bespoke service (subject to local commissioning)

## **Delivery**

Patient information in letter and website

Face to face (one to one) **or** Face to face (group education) **or** Telephone (one to one)







# **Example Process for Primary Care in the Management of Cholesterol**

### Information

Patient receives information to say it is recommended they take statin and if they wish to do so they need to contact practice – **prescription will then be issued** 

### **Advice**

Patient receives further advice on why and the benefits via letter and website

## Delivery

Patient information in letter and website

# **Example Process**

This is an example of a process which a practice may adopt when dealing with the management of cholesterol.

In this example, patients with a QRISK score of >20% receive a letter from the practice recommending that they take a stain.

Patients advised via letter that they can find more information on the healthy hearts website: what a statin is, risks and benefits and how to find out more information and support.

If the patient does not wish to take a statin, they do not need to take any further action.

\*Practices may adopt a number of different approaches based on capacity, experience and/ or patient preference.
